

## ...to achieve our Targets:

### Attendance

- Overall school attendance to reach 92% (90% - Not achieved)
- Overall 'Regular' attendance to reach 71% (68.6% - Not achieved)
- All Year Level cohorts have a minimum of 90% attendance (Achieved Year 2,4,5,6)
- Students with 'unapproved' absences decrease to 50% (Not achieved)

### Attitude, Behaviour & Effort (ABE)

- The following are indicated as 'consistently' or 'often' in 75% of student reports:
- Works to the best of his/her ability (Achieved)
- Is enthusiastic about learning (Achieved)
- Sets goals and works towards these with perseverance (Not achieved)

### NAPLAN

- Reading - 80% students will be above National Minimum Standard Yr 3 - 82% Yr 5 - 62%
- Writing - 80% students will be above National Minimum Standard Yr 3 - 67% Yr 5 - 56%
- G & P - 80% students will be above National Minimum Standard Yr 3 - 70% Yr 5 - 59%
- Spelling - 80% students will be above National Minimum Standard Yr 3 - 67% Yr 5 - 75%
- Numeracy - 80% students will be above National Minimum Standard Yr 3 - 84% Yr 5 - 70%

In the development of the 2020-2022 Business Plan, closer attention will be given to ensuring targets are achievable, based on longitudinal data to focus on value adding, and consider the capacity and potential of specific student cohorts. Targets will also be broadened to consider areas beyond ABE, Attendance and NAPLAN.

## National School Opinion Survey (NSOS)

Whilst student and staff involvement was steady, parent participation increased by 500% when the NSOS was conducted in Term 4, 2018, as compared to 2016. Our positive results showed:

### AUSLAN

- The AUSLAN program provided Year 3 students with the opportunity to learn a new language to develop their cognitive and social capabilities. Students were seen to focus on signs that centred around themselves, their family, pets, school and familiar activities.
- Students also exhibited AUSLAN capabilities at assemblies, at presentations, and in times of need, when they were unable to express their feelings.
